

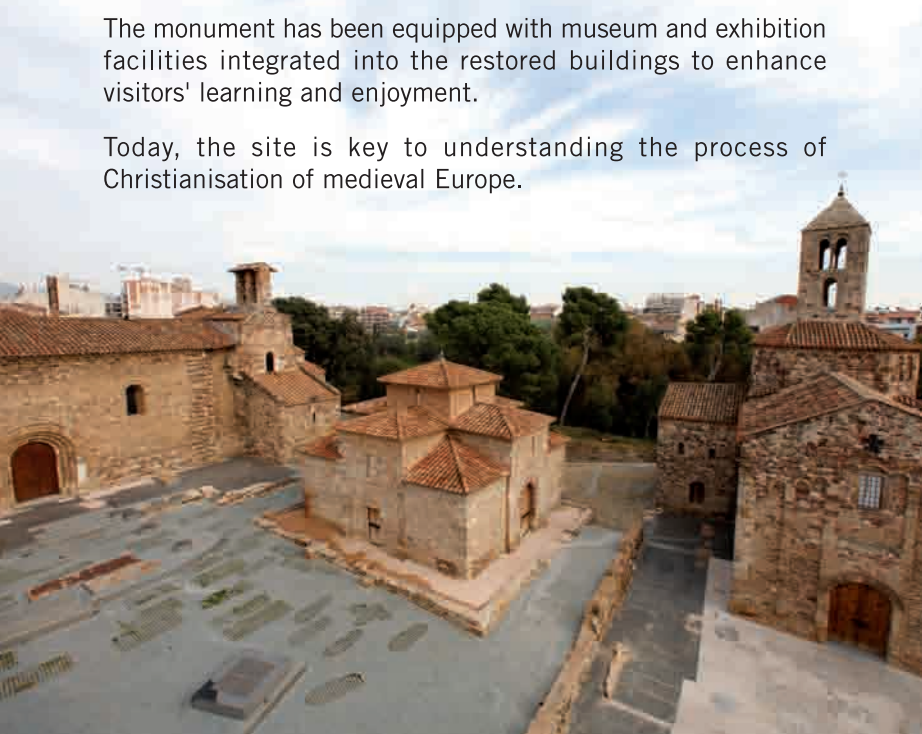


The collection of monuments and churches of Sant Pere (St Peter) forms an exceptional part of Catalonia's historic and artistic heritage. It contains a rich archaeological and artistic heritage that covers a continuous period from the Iberian Era to the present day.

Outstanding are the examples preserved from the period of the Bishopric of Ègara (450) and especially those from the 6th to 8th centuries, with the construction of the large Episcopal complex formed of the three-nave basilica of Santa Maria (St Mary) and its baptistery, the Sant Miquel (St Michael) funerary building, the three-nave parish church of Sant Pere, the residential area and the cemetery. In addition to the Romanesque buildings of Santa Maria and Sant Pere, its unique artistic features include the Early Medieval and Romanesque mural paintings as well as the Gothic altarpieces.

The monument has been equipped with museum and exhibition facilities integrated into the restored buildings to enhance visitors' learning and enjoyment.

Today, the site is key to understanding the process of Christianisation of medieval Europe.
